



# FORT BAKER BIOGRAPHIES

## GREG MOORE

Greg Moore has served since 1985 as the Executive Director of the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy, which works in partnership with the National Park Service and Presidio Trust to preserve and enhance the Golden Gate National Parks. Under Moore's leadership, the Parks Conservancy has become one of the most successful nonprofit organizations supporting any national park unit, providing over \$120 million in support to park projects and programs since its establishment. During Moore's tenure, the Conservancy has garnered national awards for excellence in interpretation, conservation, and park improvements.

Moore's early career involved work in planning, management, and interpretation with the National Park Service and other public agencies focusing on conservation and protected areas. He has also worked to develop partnerships among the public, nonprofit, and private sectors. Recently, Moore assisted the Australian, New Zealand, South African, and Italian national park systems in developing avenues for community-based conservation. Moore serves on the Board of the Association of Partners for Public Lands and is a past Board President. He also serves on the Board of the National Conservation System Foundation.



## BRIAN O'NEILL

Brian O'Neill is the Superintendent of the Golden Gate National Parks, which encompasses more than 80,000 acres of parkland within the San Francisco Bay Area. One of the most visited units of the national park system, these parks receive over 16 million visitors annually, and is one of the world's largest national parks in an urban setting.

O'Neill oversees a staff of 425 National Park Service (NPS) employees, a volunteer force of over 15,000, and more than 30 major facility and program partners. O'Neill has been a key figure over the past several years in transitioning the Presidio of San Francisco from a military post to a national park site.

O'Neill co-chairs the Interagency Cooperative Conservation Team and the Department of the Interior's Partners and Cooperation Team. He also serves as a present or former director of several Bay Area environmental organizations. For his leadership, O'Neill has been honored with several prestigious awards, including the 2004 Presidential Rank Award (the highest performance honor awarded to a Federal civilian employee), and the 2003 Gold Performance Award (the highest performance recognition given to a Department of the Interior senior executive).
